Introduction

The Conflict Incident Dataset for the southern most provinces of Thailand is created on two ideas: First, to develop body of knowledge on public policy analyses related with solutions to the unrest in the southern border provinces, and second, to respond to the lack of systematic and valid data in the middle of the complexity and uncertainty of violent incidents in the southern border provinces, especially during the first period of the spread of violence when there was no reliable data in order to understand such incidents.

The Conflict Incident Dataset for the southern most provinces is a result of continuous developments of various research projects for more than two decades, before it was finally integrated as a part of component and mission of Deepsouth Watch and Center for Conflict Studies and Cultural Diversity (CSCD). Deepsouth Watch was established in 2006 from the collaboration of people from various occupational backgrounds and expertise in order to monitor and analyse the conflict and violence in the southern border provinces, and to develop policy proposals based on data and researches. The early database was developed through several research projects of CSCD, which is a research unit of Prince of Songkla University. It was established in 2008 in order to respond to the conflict situation at that time with assistances from international organisations, foreign research institutes and embassies of foreign countries in Bangkok. These institutes recognised importance of monitoring the violent situation in the southern border provinces of Thailand, and particularly needed data from a policy research institute independent from all parties in this conflict.

The database mentioned above is an important alternative in order to understand the conflict and develop policy proposals to solve the problems in the southern border provinces. The development of the database in the last two decades can be divided into some phases, in which the database was developed along with researches and policy proposals as follows:

- 1. The first version or Version 1.0 is a result of a research in 1999 conducted by a group of researcher led by Srisompob Jitpiromsri, a lecturer of Faculty of Humanities and Social Science, Prince of Songkla University, Pattani Campus at that time. The research was about the unrest in the southern border provinces. The starting point for the development of the database was a study on data submitted to the Southern Border Provinces Administrative Centre (SBPAC). At that time it was a database for the period of 1993-2001, developed from data files of government security agencies. This initial stage of the development was financially supported by the Southern Border Provinces Administrative Centre (SBPAC).¹
- 2. Version 2.0 used the structure of the original database from the research mentioned above. It was developed after the number of violent incidents had unprecedentedly increased since 2004, its budget supported by a research project on the drug abuse in the southern border provinces under the Office of the Narcotics Control Board. At the end of the same year, this database provided clear pictures of violence compared to the

- situation in the same region in the past one decade ago. Interestingly, the study was disseminated by mass media before it was developed into an academic article.²
- **3. Version 3.0** is a step forward of the development in the following year (2005) after Srisompob and his colleagues were invited to join a research group studying the violent situation in order to fulfil one of the missions of the National Reconciliation Commission, set up by the government at that time after the tragedy in Tak Bai. The important findings of this study are the patterns and structure of violence during the previous several months, presented based on the analysis of the incident database. The structure of the database Version 3.0 was later adopted and modified as the database of Deepsouth Watch for the following years.
- **4. Version 4.0** was made through collaborations with foreign research institutions with expertise in conflict database such as the Uppsala Conflict Data Project of Uppsala University, Sweden⁴ and the Armed Conflict Location and Event Database (ACLED), the US⁵. Apart from these, there were collaborations with international organisations such as the World Bank and the Asia Foundation to conduct comparative studies about conflicts and violence in different contexts. Deepsouth Watch thus modified its database during the period of 2013-2014 in order to develop it into the Deepsouth Incident Database or DSID⁶ which included new categorisations and definitions in the database. The data were later published regularly on the organisation's website, and used for the purpose of academic analyses⁷.
- 5. Versin 5.0 or the current version is newly modified to be developed as an open database so that users are able to use the data for the purpose of researches, communication, and policy making of government agencies or local administrative organisations. This version is designed for easy online access, following the tendency of the society to regard interactions between databases and the users as a significant factor. The development of this fifth version of the database was supported by the annual budget of 2021 for the

Basic Definition

Conflict

A struggle to seize something valuable or to claim status, power, resources, rights in administration and rights on land, by causing the opposite side(s) or other parties to die, to be injured or to be forced not to fight back or to resist.

Incident

Any act which is related to or might possibly be related to the conflict in the southern border provinces, with the boundary of the southern border provinces according to the meaning mentioned above can be divided into three categories as follows:

- Category A includes incidents in three provinces and four districts, i.e. Pattani, Yala, Narathiwat and four districts in Songkhla Province adjacent to the provinces mentioned above (Chana, Na Thawi, Thepha and Saba Yoi) where the special laws⁹ have been enforced for no less than 15 years.
- Category B includes incidents in five provinces, i.e. Pattani, Yala, Narathiwat, Songkhla and Satun. These provinces are covered by Act on the Administration of the Southern Border Provinces B.E. 2553.
- Category C includes incidents in the southern provinces and other places where incidents which might possibly be related to the conflict in the southern provinces happen.

Note: Reports and analyses on the situation in the southern border provinces by Deepsouth Watch are basically limited to the Category A, except when it is specified otherwise.

Conflict Incident

Incidents happening in the five southern border provinces in connection with violence perpetrated by those who are related to the conflict in the southern border provinces which are conducted continuously to the end.

Violent Conflict Incident

Various forms of conflicts between individuals and groups which are related to the forms of physical actions causing concrete consequences such as death, injury, and destruction of properties, or other forms of violence.

Non-violent Conflict Incident

Expressions or movements by any group and various incidents with the purposes of expressing disagreement, objection, or appealing, such as staging demonstrations, circulating letters, issuing statements, filing complaints of groups, symbolic struggles, etc.

Counting of one incident

Considered from continuous actions which are mutually connected to the end, with the condition for considering them as one incident based on fulfilment of the two following conditions:

- 1. Happening or covering the same geographical point.
- 2. Happening continuously to the end in the same period of time.

Examinations and modifications of data in any given record are conducted in the time frame of one year, starting from the date of the incident(s), except when there is modification of a new database.

Note: The modification of the database version 5 will take approximately two years between 2021 and 2022.

Counting of incidents happening in the same period of time

Considered from the duration of the time of continuous incidents or actions until the end of the actions related to the incident. In one incident, there could be more than one category of incidents, but the only main incident is counted, judged from the intentions of perpetrator(s), socio-psychological impact(s) in a wider society, and political message(s) of the incidents.

Counting of incidents happening in the same place

When the place of the incident is unclear, it is allowed to specify the place at the village level. Therefore, the place of incidents can be divided into two levels:

- Level 1 Specifying the place of incidents by the same geographical spot when all the incidents happen within the range of 100 meter. In case when it is impossible to specify the initial spot, it is allowed to state the position of the place of incident by using a village level spot instead.
- Level 2 Specifying the places of incidents by the name of these places, such as names of streets, names of villages, names of cities, etc.

3. Vehicles used in incidents

4. Effects on Actors in Incidents

The state or things happening to the actors in an incident, both the perpetrator(s) and victim(s) as the consequence of incidents. In one incident, the effects could be more than one item. The details are as follows.

Type of Incident

Characters of actions taken by perpetrators (subjects) toward victims (objects), either by using weapons or not, or using other objects or not. These incidents are divided into the following categories.

1. Shooting

Use of pistols, guns for war, Thai-made guns, or imitation guns in order to attack others by shooting until causing physical damages, including retaliatory shootings by civilians who own guns in order to defend themselves.

2. Bomb

Use of standard explosives or improvised explosive devices to cause explosions through various ways, such as planting bombs, hurling bombs, landmines, firebombs, 40 mm grenade launchers or M79 etc. in public places or private spaces. These incidents are staged by perpetrators who want to cause physical as well as psychological damages to individuals or groups of people who are targeted or even to ordinary people. Apart from these, activities related to bombings or causing similar effects to bombings such as fear and cautions are also included in this category.

0201 Actual bombing

0202 Explosive disposed

0203 Finding or disposal of false explosive

0204 Finding or examination of suspicious objects that are not explosives

3. Arson

Act of setting fire with intentions to destroy valuables, properties, vehicles, buildings. Setting fire on bodies of people to destroy them is excluded from this category.

0301 Arson attack related to the conflict

Fires whose origins of fires are specified as related to the conflict according to reliable reports.

0302 Fire

Fires whose origins of fires are unknown, but related to the conflict according to reliable reports.

4. Assault

Use of forces to attack or physically damage others, regardless of involving use of weapons or not. Apart from this, sexual violence is also included in this category.

0401 Bodily damage caused by sharp weapon

Note: Sharp objects refer to any tool or object with sharp edges.

0402 Bodily damage caused by weapon without sharp edge

Note: Weapons without sharp edges refer to any tool, device, or object without any sharp edges, used as a tool in order to physically damage people who are targeted.

0403 Bodily damage without using weapon

Use of perpetrators' body to damage others without involving use of any object or tool.

0404 Sexual damage

Acts of sexual obscenity, molests, or rape that cause injury or death, or psychological effects.

0499 Others

5. Agitation

Any act related to military operations of various parties with intentions to cause disturbance, fear, worry, and alarm. In t his category, acts of threatening others by using violence which are related to the military operations are also included as follows:

- 0501 Cutting trees to block roads
- 0502 Burning car tyres on roads
- 0503 Scattering spikes on roads
- 0504 Suspending banners with messages implying use of violence
- 0505 Spraying messages or graffiti with messages implying use of violence
- 0506 Distributing or circulating leaflets with messages implying use of violence
- 0599 Others

6. Sabotage

Any act of causing disturbance in communication, public transport, or other basic infrastructure, divided into the following categories.

0601 Mobile Phone System

Such as telephone repeater stations, mobile phone transmission tower etc.

0602 Electricity System

Such as high voltage transmission towers, general transmission towers, transformers, etc.

0603 Train System

Such as train stations, trains, train rails, locomotives, etc.

0604 Air Transportation System

Such as airports, airplanes, airport control tower, etc.

0605 Land Transportation System

Such as bas stations, bases, etc.

0699 Others

7. Violation of Property Rights

Acts of violating property rights that are related to the conflict, divided into the following categories.

0701 Stealing

Any act of taking other people's properties or jointly owned by them, with the intention of holding the properties for certain personal interests, such as selling or giving to other people.

0702 Theft

Any act of seizing other people's property by using violence or intimidation of damaging them so that the owners of the properties are willing to submit their properties or for the purpose of taking such properties easily.

0703 Robbery

Any act of seizing other properties committed by more than three people.

0704 Vandalism

Any act of destroying valuables, properties, vehicles, or buildings, without using fire (code 3) or causing destruction (code 6), such as destroying surfaces of rubber trees, destroying road signs or traffic signs, etc.

0799 Others

8. Robbery of Weapon

Any act of using force to obtain or gain weapons belonging to other people, regardless of the perpetrators' intentions to steal, rob or plunder.

9. Armed Clash

Incidents involving armed encounters between at least two parties of military forces or armed groups. Such encounters could be started with attacks or ambushes of either side.

10. Extreme Violence

Any act of causing violent incidents which involves more than two categories of actions of perpetrators against victims or use of cruelty, maltreatment or act of degrading humanities of the victims.

1001 Physically damaging children and youths under 15 years old

1002 Killing and damaging dead body

1003 Beheading

1099 Others

11. Intimidation

Any act of intimidation of using violence, by communications through telephones, letters, goods or other symbolic objects such as rice, boiled eggs, white clothes, bullets, etc.

12. Dead Body Found

Reports of finding dead people's body or unidentifiable parts of body, which might be involved killings.

13. Torture

Any act by which severe pain or suffering, whether physical or mental, is intentionally inflicted on a person for such purposes as obtaining from him or a third person information or a confession, punishing him for an act he or a third person has committed or is suspected of having committed, or intimidating or coercing him or a third person, or

for any reason based on discrimination of any kind, when such pain or suffering is inflicted by or at the instigation of or with the consent or acquiescence of a public official or other person acting in an official capacity.¹¹

14. Abduction

Any act by a person or group of people of arrest, detention, or other actions of depriving others from physical liberty.

1401 Enforced Disappearance

The arrest, detention, abduction or any other form of deprivation of liberty by agents of the State or by persons or groups of persons acting with the authorization, support or acquiescence of the State, followed by a refusal to acknowledge the deprivation of liberty or by concealment of the fate or whereabouts of the disappeared person, which place such a person outside the protection of the law¹².

1402 Kidnapping for Ransom

Any act of abduction by a person or group of people with the intention to obtain ransom money or other exchanges.

1499 Others

15. Surround and Searching

Operations of state officers by using military forces of the state in order to surround a space or place for search, investigation, or arrest of suspects, or to suppress resistance or prevent violent incidents by a person or group of people as a counter insurgency measure. The agent in the incident of this type is the commander in charge of the incident.

16. Suicide or Suicide Attempt

Any act of a person attempting killing himself, as a consequence of violent incident in one way or another, for instance, a police officer committing suicide due to stresses caused by his duty amid the unrest, or a legal officer trying to commit suicide in order to communicate injustice in the justice system, etc.

17. Symbolic Advocacy

Any act of a person or a group of people with intentions of disseminating political messages through activities without directly using violence, including messages without open intimidation to life (intimidating messages is included in agitation in Code 5). These actions include:

18. Demonstration

Any act of a group of people in the form of assembling in a place at the same time, with political demands either as proposals or objections related to the conflict with the state. Any assembly or parade organised by state agencies for general agendas are not included in this category.

1801 Peaceful Protest

Any act of a group of people assembling in a period of time to communicate their political demands related to the conflict with the state and other actors who are involved in the conflict, without involving any form of violent incident caused by any party.

1802 Riot

Any act of a group of people assembling in a period of time to communicate their political demands related to the conflict with the state and other actors who are involved in the conflict, involving use of violence by the group of people assembling or by other parties.

1899 Others

19. Dispersion

Any act of state officers to dissolve assemblies or arrest and/or detain individuals or a group of people assembling at any given time to deliver their political demands.

88. Unclear

99. Others

Cause of Incident

1. Self-determination Conflict

Any act of causing incidents driven or motivated by intentions for political expressions by claiming rights to self-determination or territorial integrity, either involving or not involving use of violence.

11 Insurgency

Any incident caused by actors who are not state officers against targets that are components of the state or civilians, with intentions to undermine the legitimacy of the state power, and/or to claim rights to self-determination, either involving or not involving use of violence.

12 Counter Insurgency

Any incident caused by actors from the state or a group of people supported by the state with intentions to sustain insurgency of non-state actors and/or to defend sovereign rights and territorial integrity of the Thai state.

13 Officials' Tension

Any incident motivated or caused by tensions inside the components of the state in the context of solving the conflict. For instance, conflict of orders from commanders, conflicts of interests, problems of deficiency in welfare for soldiers at operational levels, or transferring to the area with risks or violence, etc.

19 Others

2. Administrative Conflict

Any act of causing any incident with intentions to hold or compete for administrative power or rights in administrating public resources and political institutions, including efforts to access to or obtain power in basic administration.

21 Administrative Conflict

Any incident with intentions or factors related with competition, compromise or struggle to hold power related to administrative power struggles inside the cabinet, consideration for law drafts or examination of power balance in the parliament, or use of various political institutions' power, such as trials in law courts, campaigning for constitution drafting, policies of political parties, and roles of the monarchy, etc.

22 Electoral Violent Conflict

Any incident motivated or caused by factors related to electoral competition both at national and regional level, including selections of people to occupy positions for public affairs.

221 National Election

Any incident motivated or caused by factors related to competitions in the elections for members of the House of Representatives and senators.

222 Local Election

Any incident motivated or caused by factors related to competitions in the elections for administrative organisations

at local level, i.e. chiefs and members of Provincial Administration Organization (PAO), Subdistrict Administration Organisation (TAO), and every type of municipalities.

223 Other Election and Selection

Any incident motivated or caused by factors related to competitions in the elections or selections of people for positions with administrative power that are not at national or local level (specified in Code 221 and 222), such as subdistrict headmen, village headmen, presidents of community committees, imams, presidents and members of provincial Islamic committees, members of the advisory council for administration and development, committee members for other independent organisations, etc.

29 Others

3. Resource Conflict

Any act of causing any incident with intentions to obtain or allocate power in management of various resources.

31 Land

Any incident related to possession of land, lease of land, management of land, and dispute on overlapping ownership of land, and development of land and housing development.

32 Natural Resource

Any incident related to management of natural resources, such as forests, water resources, air, minerals, petroleum, sea and seashore resources, etc.

33 Man-mad Resource

Any incident caused by power struggle over administration of various man-made technologies modified from natural resources such as communications, electricity, energy, vaccine, etc.

34 Access to Economic Opportunities

Any incident caused by inequality or lack of opportunities, competitions or struggle to access to information, financial resources, etc. from government agencies or private sectors in supporting or developing quality of life.

35 Work Condition and Labour

Any incident caused by working environment and treatment of labours, such as security in working place, wage of labours, holidays and break of the work, welfare, etc.

36 Government developing program affecting resource and way of life

Any incident caused by government developing programs that affect natural resources and the local people's way of life from the view point of justice, participation of people, transparency in implementation, effects to the environment and people's way of life, including disagreement on the direction of the development.

39 Others

4. Drug-related Crime

Any act of crime with motivations or reasons directly related to every kind of drugs, especially illegal addictive drugs, either in production, circulation and addiction.

5. General Crime

Any act of general crime such as disputes over personal interests, robbery of properties, selling of illegal goods etc. that are reported in media or state officers' operation reports authorized by three parties, i.e. the military, the police and the administration as acts of general crime.

Aspect of Incident

Characteristics or patterns of incidents are categorised according to the frame of significant concepts for the benefit of analysing the situation as follows:

1. Set of Incident

Characteristics or patterns of conflict incidents considered on the relation of incidents happening in the same period of time, divided into two following categories:

11 Single Incident

An incident staged by a subject (subjects) against an object (objects) that involves only one type of incident, such as a group of people killing a paramilitary rangers with guns (shooting), or a case of planting bomb under a road in Saiburi District (bombing), etc.

12 Continuous Incident

An incident that includes more than one category of act happening continuously or in a connected way, with the main incident considered by the evaluation of wide socio-psychological effects and political communication, including the evaluation of the intentions of the perpetrator(s). For instance, in an incident in which a group of people killed a car technician by using guns, and when the state officers came to the place of the incident, the bomb(s) planted by the perpetrator(s) in the same area detonated was, causing injury of many officers (shooting-bombing). The category of the main incident is bombing, and the secondary category is shooting, and so on.

2. Violent and Nonviolent Incident

21 Violent Incident

Any incident involving direct uses of violence, regardless of which party the incident was staged.

22 Nonviolent Incident

Any incident without involving direct uses of violence (categories of subincidents under the Code 17 and the Category 18.1)

3. Civilian-targeted Violent Incident

31 One-sided Incident

Any acct of using direct violence against civilians in a one-sided way, by an individual, armed groups, state officers, or groups of civilians with arms provided by the state.

32 Two-sided Incident

Any act of causing violent incidents between individuals, armed groups, state officers or groups of civilians with arms provided by the state and experience of joining military trainings, with both sides having weapons for these acts.

The Old Actor ID is not limited to units, i.e. XXXXXXYZZZ, starting from the code of the incident itself, followed by the status of the actor (perpetrators and victims), and ended with numbers of three digits, in the following way.

3. Type of Actor

A person or group of people who become objects in conflict incidents and directly affected, such as injury, death or other effects. Such individuals might be perpetrators of other incidents. They are divided into the following categories.

31 Security Officer

3101 Military

Regular personnel of the army, the navy and the air force.

3102 Paramilitary Ranger

Personnel belonging to a paramilitary ranger unit directly under the army and Royal Thai Marine Corps of the navy.

3103 Police

Personnel of Provincial Police, Border Patrol Police (Tor Chor Dor.), Special Operation Unit (Nor Por Phor.), or police officers from central units such as Special Branch Bureau, Crime Suppression Division etc.

3104 Interior Ministry Officer

Government officers of Department of Provincial Administration, Ministry of Interior in control of chain of command in security missions (such as governor, deputy governor, Chief of the Security Affairs Branch, District Chief, Deputy District Chief, Local Affairs Officer, etc. including Volunteer Defense Corps (Or Sor) and Subdistrict Defense Team (Chor Khor Tor.)

3105 Kamnan (Subdistrict Chief) and Village Headman

Apart from kamnan and village headman, including subdistrict inspector, assistant village headman and subdistrict doctor.

3106 Pro-Government Militias

Members of civilian groups trained in use of arms and supported by security sectors of the state to perform the task of defending their own communities and/or support the military forces of the state, consisting of Village Security Teams (Chor Ror Bor.), Village Defence Volunteers (Or Ror Bor), Town Defence Volunteers (Or Ror Mor), Thai Nation Defence Volunteers (Thor Sor Por Chor), and Civilian Anti-Disaster Volunteers (Or Phor Por Ror.).

3107 Spv

Individual specified or reported as acting as information source of any other individual or group whose activities are controlled or ordered by state officers or security sectors.

3199 Other security officers

32 Rebels

3201 Unidentified Resistant Groups

Individuals reported as members of a movement or group resisting against the state without specifying which group these individuals belong to. The Thai state officers might use such different terms as perpetrators of violent incident, insurgents, people with different opinions from the state, misguided people, etc.

3202 BRN

Individuals reported as members of the National Revolutionary Front or Barisan Revolusi Nasional (BRN). In some cases the organisation is referred as RKK, abbreviation of Runda Kumpulan Kecil, a small size military unit which the Thai authorities believed as the military force of BRN.

3203 PULO

Individuals reported as a member of any splinter group of the Patani United Liberation Organisation (PULO)

2299 Other rebel Groups

33 Civilian

3301 Educational Personnel

Individuals working in educational institutions of every level, or performing tasks related with education, consisting of teachers, lecturers, officers of educational institutions and government agencies related to educational administration, but not including teachers of Islamic subjects in private educational institutions (who are included in Code 3309)

3302 Health Personnel

Individuals working in medical institutions of every level, both those of the government or private, or preforming tasks related to public health, consisting of doctors, nurses, permanent workers in medical institutions, village health volunteers, but but not including subdistrict doctors (who are in Code 3105)

3303 Justice System Personnel

Individuals working in justice system, consisting of judges, public prosecutors, court officers, officers in the office of public prosecutor, correction officers, but not including investigation officers or police officers (who are in Code 3103), or any other officers who are authorised to prepare case files, such as officers of Department of Special Investigation(DSI), Office of the National Anti-Corruption Commission etc.

3304 Civilian Government Officer

Individuals working in government agencies at central, regional and local level, with the status either as government officers, officers or employers, i.e. civilian government officers without any responsibility in security, such as administrative officers in management, officers of provincial agriculture offices or provincial fishery offices, community development officers of districts, management officers of municipalities etc., including officers or employers of independent organisation based on the Constitution.

3305 State Enterprise Officer

Individuals working in state enterprises, either as permanent workers or temporary employees.

3306 Farmer

Individuals working in sectors related to agriculture, both planting and breeding, including business entrepreneurs and employees related to agriculture.

3307 Business Entrepreneur

Individuals with their own private business or various freelance occupations, with main incomes from profits of investment, such as trading, running restaurants, land brokers, etc.

3308 Worker and Employee

Individuals working as employees of private business, with main incomes from salary, daily payment, or payment for each piece of work, such as employees in motorbike workshops, employees in convenience stores, factory workers, couriers, etc.

3309 Islamic Religious Leader

Individuals whose works are related to Islamic affairs or rituals, including intellectuals teaching Islam in institutions of every level, and administrators of such institutions, such as imams, khatibs, bilals, headmasters of pondok schools, ustaz, ustazah, directors of private Islamic schools etc.

3310 Buddhist Monk

Individuals whose works are related to Buddhist rituals and dissemination of Buddhism, such as monks, novices, etc.

3311 Children and Youth

Any person who is under 18 years old.

3312 University Student

Individuals who are students of higher educational institutions (including high vocational certificate level)

3313 Foreigner
